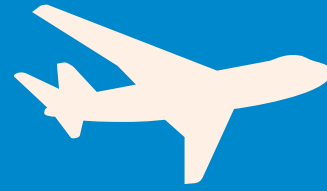

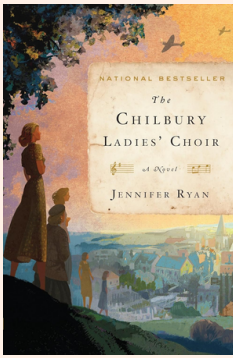

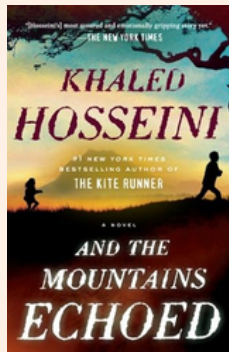

DESTINATION: ENGLAND

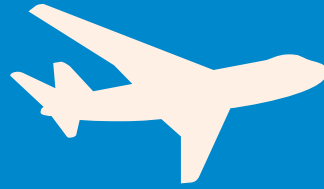


***And The Mountains Echoed*** by Khaled Hosseini

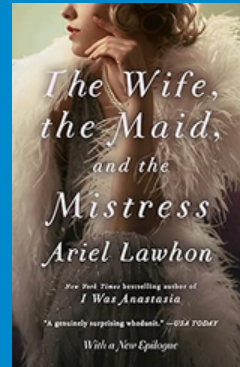
A rich look at the lives of average people and how one act echoes across families and spans the globe.

DESTINATION: AFGHANISTAN

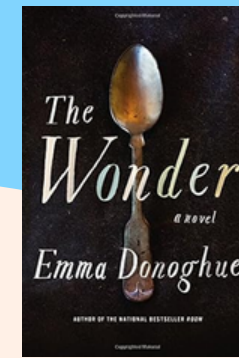


***The Wife, the Maid, and the Mistress*** by Ariel Lawhon

DESTINATION: NEW YORK CITY

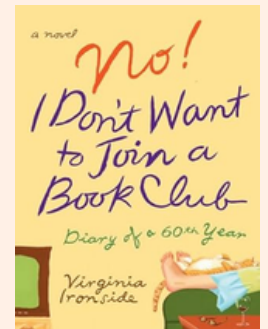


***The Wonder*** by Emma Donoghue

We gave this book a grade of C, and that's being generous. The narrator is realistic but unlikeable with few redeeming qualities. It's something quick to read when you're bored, but it won't become a classic.
